LEGAL ISSUES

Law Enforcement Access

The district may report or disclose education records to law enforcement and juvenile justice authorities if the disclosure concerns law enforcement's or juvenile justice authorities' ability to effectively serve, prior to adjudication, the student whose records are released. The officials and authorities to whom such information is disclosed must comply with applicable restrictions set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 1232g (b)(1)(E).

If the district reports a crime committed by a student with a disability as defined in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), the district will transmit copies of the special education and disciplinary records to the authorities to whom the district reported the crime.

Law enforcement officials also have access to directory information and may obtain access to student education records in emergency situations as allowed by law. Otherwise, law enforcement officials must obtain a subpoena or consent from the parent or eligible student before a student's education records will be disclosed.

Children's Division Access

The district may disclose education records to representatives of the Children's Division (CD) of the Department of Social Services when reporting child abuse and neglect in accordance with law. Once the CD obtains custody of a student, CD representatives may also have access to education records in accordance with law. CD representatives may also have access to directory information and may obtain access to student education records in emergency situations, as allowed by law.

STUDENT RECORDS

Definitions

For the purposes of this procedure, the following terms are defined:

Student -- Any person who attends or has attended a school in the school district and for whom the district maintains education records.

Eligible Student -- A student or former student who has reached age 18 or is attending a post-secondary school.

Parent -- A biological or adoptive parent of a student, a guardian or an individual acting as a parent or guardian in the absence of the student's parent or guardian.

Education Records -- Any record (in handwriting, print, tapes, film, computer or other medium) maintained by the school district or an agent of the district that contains information directly related to a student, including student health records, *except*:

1. Records kept in the sole possession of the maker of the record, used only as a personal memory aid and not accessible or revealed to any other person except a temporary substitute for the maker of the record.
2. Records created and maintained by the school district law enforcement unit for law enforcement purposes.
3. An employment record that relates exclusively to an individual in his or her capacity as an employee of the school district and that is not available for use for any other purpose.
4. Alumni records that contain information about a student after he or she is no longer in attendance at the district and that do not relate to the person as a student.

Directory Information -- Information contained in an education record of a student that generally would not be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. The school district details directory information in policy JO.

Health Records -- Any record relating to a student's health or disability including, but not limited to, doctor's orders, doctor's notes, medical evaluations, medical diagnoses, information regarding medications, 504 plans, Individualized Education Programs (IEP) and Individualized Health Plans (IHP). A health record is a type of education record.

School Official -- A person who has a legitimate educational interest and who meets one (1) of the following criteria:

1. A person employed by the district as an administrator, supervisor, instructor or support staff member, including health or medical staff.
2. A person elected to the School Board.
3. A person paid by the district to perform a special task, such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant or therapist.
4. A person who is employed by the school district's law enforcement unit.
5. A student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or who is assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.
6. A screened volunteer, as defined in administrative procedures, who has authorization from the district and is working under the direct supervision of a staff member.

Legitimate Educational Interest -- A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official is:

1. Performing a task that is specified in his or her position description or by a contract agreement.
2. Performing a task related to a student's education in accordance with the school official's position. 3. Performing a task related to the discipline of a student in accordance with the school official's position.
4. Providing a service or benefit relating to the student or student's family, such as health care, counseling, job placement or financial aid.
5. Maintaining the safety and security of the campus.
6. Under the direct supervision of a staff member and, with authorization from the district, assisting a staff member in performing his or her job.

Education Records

A. General

1. Education records shall be retained according to the guidelines set forth in the retention schedules developed by the Office of the Missouri Secretary of State.
2. Teacher and staff comments on education records will be professional and for the limited purpose of serving the student.
3. Parents and/or students may refuse to disclose a student's social security number to the district unless required by law.
4. Pursuant to state law, the permanent record of a student reading below the fifth-grade reading level at the end of his or her sixth-grade year shall carry a notation advising that such student has not met minimal reading standards. The notation shall stay on the student's record until such time as the district determines that the student has met minimal reading standards.
5. It is the responsibility of the principal and the professional staff of the school to see that such records are kept secure, confidential and are utilized in accordance with the law.

B. Review of Education Records by Parents or Eligible Students

1. Education records shall be open for inspection by parents of a student or an eligible student. Both parents have access to their child's school records until and unless a court orders otherwise. Therefore, a copy of any applicable court order that restricts any parent's access to the student's education records must be filed with the school principal in order to certify to the district that a parent's access rights are limited or denied pursuant to the court's directions.
2. The parents or the eligible student should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies as precisely as possible the record or records they wish to inspect. The principal (or appropriate school official) will make the needed arrangements for access as promptly as possible and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. Access must be given as soon as possible, but within three (3) business days. However, the period for document production may exceed three (3) days for reasonable cause. When a record contains information about students other than a parent's child or the eligible student, the parent or eligible student may not inspect and review the portion of the record that pertains to other students.
3. If a parent or eligible student believes the education records related to the student contain information that is inaccurate, misleading or in violation of the student's privacy, he or she may ask the district to amend the record by following the appeals procedures outlined in this procedure.

C. Transfer of Education Records

1. The district will respond to a request for records from another school district enrolling a student within five (5) business days of receiving the request. However, if the student's record has been marked pursuant to notification by the highway patrol that the student has been classified as a missing child, the record shall not be forwarded to the requesting district and the district will notify the missing persons unit of the highway patrol of the record request.
2. Upon notification that a student has transferred to any other school district, the district will forward any written notification the district has received from a juvenile officer, sheriff, chief of police or other appropriate law enforcement authority that a petition has been filed in juvenile court alleging that the student has committed an offense listed in § 167.115.1, RSMo., and the notification of disposition of such case, to the superintendent of the new school district in which the student has enrolled.

D. Annual Notification of Rights to Parents and Students

1. The district shall annually notify parents of students currently in attendance or eligible students in attendance of their rights under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and FERPA regulation by publication in the student handbook(s) or by distributing notification to the parents or eligible students at the beginning of the school year.
2. The district shall annually notify parents of students currently in attendance and eligible students currently in attendance of the directory information the district will release without written permission.
3. The district may notify parents of secondary school students that it is required to release the student's name, address and telephone listing to military recruiters and institutions of higher education upon request. Parents or eligible students may request that the district not release this information, and the district will comply with the request.
4. The district will notify parents at least annually of its policy on the collection, disclosure or use of personal information collected from students for the purpose of marketing or for selling that information or otherwise providing that information to others for that purpose, including arrangements to protect student privacy that are provided by the district in the event of such collection, disclosure or use (see policies JHDA and KI). Parents will be directly notified annually at the beginning of the school year of the specific or approximate dates during the school year when such collection, disclosure or use of personal information is scheduled or expected to be scheduled. The district will also offer an opportunity for the parent or eligible student to opt the student out of participation in any such activity.

E. Annual Notification of Directory Information

1. The district shall annually notify parents and eligible students of the directory information the district will release without written consent. Parents or eligible students will have ten (10) school days after the annual public notice to provide notice in writing to the school district that they choose to not have this information released. Unless notified to the

contrary in writing within the ten (10) school-day period, the school district may disclose any of those items designated as directory information without the parent or eligible student's prior written consent including in print and electronic publications of the school district.

2. Directory information is considered a "public record" that must be released by the district to any person who requests it under the Missouri Sunshine Law.

F. Release of Education Records

1. Disclosure of information from a student's education records will be made only with the written consent of the parent or eligible student, subject to the following exceptions. The district may disclose education record information without consent when the disclosure is:
 2. To school officials who have a legitimate educational interest in the records.
 3. To officials of another school, upon request, in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.
 4. Directory information. If the district annually notifies parents and eligible students that directory information may be released without prior written consent and gives parents and eligible students the opportunity to notify the district in writing that they do not want the information released, the district may release directory information without prior consent.
 5. To military recruiters or institutions of higher education that have requested the names, addresses and telephone listings of secondary school students. However, the district will honor a request from a secondary school student or his or her parent not to release the information.
 6. To authorized representatives of state and local educational authorities.
 7. To law enforcement and juvenile justice authorities if the disclosure concerns law enforcement or juvenile justice authorities' ability to effectively serve, prior to adjudication, the student whose records are released. The officials and authorities to whom such information is disclosed must comply with applicable restrictions set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 1232g (b)(1)(E).
 8. To accrediting organizations to carry out their accrediting functions.
 9. To parents of a dependent student, as defined in section 152 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954.
 10. To parents of a student who is not an eligible student or to the student.
 11. To comply with a judicial order or a lawfully issued subpoena. Unless otherwise ordered, the district will make a reasonable effort to notify the parent or eligible student of the order or subpoena in advance of compliance, so that the parent or student may seek protective action.
 12. In connection with a student's request for or receipt of financial aid to determine the eligibility amount or conditions of the financial aid or to enforce the terms and conditions of the aid.
 13. To the Comptroller General of the United States, the Attorney General of the United States, the Secretary of the United States Department of Education or an official or employee of the Department of Education acting for the Secretary under a delegation of authority, or state and local education authorities in connection with an audit or evaluation of federal or state supported education programs or for the enforcement of or compliance with federal legal requirements relating to these programs.
 14. To appropriate parties in a health or safety emergency.
 15. To other persons authorized to receive education records pursuant to FERPA and 34 C.F.R., Part 99 or other applicable laws. The school district will maintain a record of all requests for and/or disclosures of information from a student's education records. The record will indicate the name of the party making the request, any additional party to whom the information may be redisclosed and the legitimate interest the party had in requesting or obtaining the information. The record may be reviewed by the parents or the eligible student. This paragraph does not apply if the request was from or the disclosure was to:
 - The parent or eligible student.
 - School officials within the district who have a legitimate educational interest in the student's educational records
 - A party with written consent from the parent or eligible student.
 - A party seeking directory information.
 - A party seeking or receiving the records as directed by a law enforcement subpoena if the issuing court or other issuing agency has ordered that the existence or the contents of the subpoena or the information furnished in response to the subpoena not be disclosed.

The district may charge a fee for copies of student education records, unless the charge effectively prevents a parent or eligible student from exercising the right to inspect and review the student's education records. The fee will not exceed the amount authorized under the Missouri Sunshine Law.

G. Appeals Procedures

Parents or eligible students have the right to ask to have education records corrected that they believe are inaccurate, misleading or in violation of their privacy rights. Following are the procedures for the correction of education records:

1. Parents or the eligible student must ask the school district to amend a record. In doing so, they should identify the part of the record they want changed and specify why they believe it is inaccurate, misleading or in violation of the student's privacy rights. The request should be made to the building principal.
2. The school district will decide whether it will amend the record as requested within a reasonable time after receiving the request. If it decides not to amend the record as requested, the district will notify the parents or eligible students of the decision and inform them of their right to a hearing to challenge the content of the student's education records on the grounds that the information included is inaccurate, misleading or in violation of the student's privacy rights.
3. Upon request, the school district will hold a hearing within a reasonable time after the request is received. The district will notify the parents or eligible student, reasonably in advance, of the date, place and time of the hearing.
4. The hearing will be conducted by a hearing officer who is a disinterested party; however, the hearing officer may be an official of the district. The parents or eligible student shall be afforded a full and fair opportunity to present evidence relevant to the issues raised in the original request to amend the student's education records. The parents or eligible student may be assisted by one (1) or more individuals of their choice, including an attorney.
5. The school district will prepare a written decision based solely on the evidence presented at the hearing within a reasonable period of time after the hearing. The decision will include a summary of the evidence presented and the reasons for the decision.
6. If the school district decides that the information is inaccurate, misleading or in violation of the student's right of privacy, it will amend the record and notify the parents or eligible student of the amendment in writing.
7. If the school district decides that the challenged information is not inaccurate, misleading or in violation of the student's right of privacy, it will notify the parents or eligible student that they have a right to place in the record a statement commenting on the challenged information and/or a statement setting forth reasons for disagreeing with the decision.
8. The statement will be maintained as part of the student's education records as long as the contested portion is maintained. If the school district discloses the contested portion of the record, it must also disclose the statement.

Notice of Non-discrimination

Applicants for admission and employment, students, parents of elementary and secondary school students, employees, sources of referral of applicants for admission and employment, and all unions or professional organizations holding collective bargaining or professional agreements with Cole R-I School District are hereby notified that this institution does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, religion, ancestry, disability in admission or access to, or treatment or employment in its programs and activities. Any person having inquiries concerning Cole R-I School District compliance with the regulations implementing Title VI, Title IX, or Section 504 is directed to the Superintendent of Cole R-I School District, 13600 Rt. C, Russellville, MO 65074, (573) 782-3534 who has been designated to coordinate the institution's efforts to comply with the regulations implementing Title VI, Title IX, and Section 504. Any person may also contact the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights, U.S. Department of Education, regarding the institution's compliance with the regulations implementing Title VI, Title IX, Section 504 and the Boy Scouts Equal Access Act.

Public Notice – Special Education

All responsible public agencies are required to locate, evaluate, and identify children with disabilities who are under the jurisdiction of the agency, regardless of the severity of the disability, including children attending private schools, children who live outside the district but are attending a private school within the district, highly mobile children, such as migrant and homeless children, children who are wards of the state, and children who are suspected of having a disability and in need of special education even though they are advancing from grade to grade. The Cole R-I School District assures that it will provide a free, appropriate public education (FAPE) to all eligible children with disabilities between the ages of 3 and 21 under its jurisdiction. Disabilities include autism, deaf/blindness, emotional disorders, hearing impairment and deafness, intellectual disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairments, specific learning disabilities, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, visual impairment/blindness and young child with a developmental delay. The Cole R-I School District assures that it will provide information and referral services necessary to assist the State in the implementation of early intervention services for infants and toddlers eligible for the Missouri First Steps program. The Cole R-I School District assures that personally identifiable information collected, used, or maintained by the agency for the purposes of identification, evaluation, placement or provision of FAPE of children with disabilities may be inspected and/or reviewed by their parents/guardians. Parents/guardians may request amendment to the educational record if the parent/guardian believes the record is inaccurate, misleading, or violates the privacy or other rights of their child. Parents have the right to file complaints with the U.S. Department of Education or the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education concerning alleged failures by the district to meet the requirements of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). The Cole R-I School District has developed a Local Compliance Plan for the implementation of State Regulations for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). This plan contains the agency's policies and

procedures regarding storage, disclosure to third parties, retention and destruction of personally identifiable information and the agency's assurances that services are provided in compliance with the General Education Provision Act (GEPA). This plan may be reviewed at the Cole R-I Special Services office during regular school hours.

Public Notice – 504

The Cole R-I School District, as a recipient of federal financial assistance from the United States Department of Education and operates a public elementary or secondary education program and/or activity, is required to undertake to identify and locate every qualified person residing in the District who is not receiving a public education; and take appropriate steps to notify disabled persons and their parents or guardians of the District's duty. The Cole R-I School District assures that it will provide a free appropriate public education (FAPE) to each qualified disabled person in the District's jurisdiction regardless of the nature or severity of the person's disability. For purposes of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the provision of an appropriate education is the provision of regular or special and related aids and services that (i) are designed to meet individual educational needs of disabled persons as adequately as the needs of nondisabled persons are met and (ii) are based on adherence to procedures that satisfy the requirements of the 504 federal regulations. The Cole R-I School District has developed a 504 Procedures Manual for the implementation of federal regulations for Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, Subpart D. This Procedures Manual may be reviewed at the Cole R-I Special Services office during regular school hours.

Universal Screening and Early Dyslexia Identification

In the 2018-19 school year and subsequent years, each public school, including each charter school, shall conduct dyslexia screenings for students in the appropriate year (K-3rd) consistent with the findings and recommendations of the task force created under section 633.420. "Dyslexia screening" is a short test conducted by a teacher or school counselor to determine whether a student likely has dyslexia or a related disorder in which a positive result does not represent a medical diagnosis but indicates that the student could benefit from approved support. The Cole R-I School District's Dyslexia Plan is posted on the school's website or may be reviewed upon request at the Special Services office during regular school hours.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age (eligible students) certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

1. *The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the school receives a request for access.*

Parents or eligible students should submit a written request to the superintendent, identifying the record(s) they wish to inspect. The superintendent will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

2. *The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate.*

Parents or eligible students may ask Cole R-I to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate. They should write the superintendent, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate. If Cole R-I decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the school will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3. *The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.*

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the school as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health, or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the school; a person or company with whom the school has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, Cole R-I discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. [NOTE: FERPA requires a school district to make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent or student of the records request unless it states in its annual notification that it intends to forward records on request.]

4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by Cole R-I to comply with the requirements of FERPA.

Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA)

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232h; 34 CFR Part 98) applies to programs that receive funding from the U.S. Department of Education (ED). PPRA is intended to protect the rights of parents and students in two ways:

1. It seeks to ensure that schools and contractors make instructional materials available for inspection by parents if those materials will be used in connection with an ED-funded survey, analysis, or evaluation in which their children participate; and
2. It seeks to ensure that schools and contractors obtain written parental consent before minor students are required to participate in any ED-funded survey, analysis, or evaluation that reveals information concerning:
Political affiliations; Mental and psychological problems potentially embarrassing to the student and his/her family; Sex behavior and attitudes; Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating and demeaning behavior; Critical appraisals of other individuals with whom respondents have close family relationships; Legally recognized privileged or analogous relationships, such as those of lawyers, physicians, and ministers; or Income (other than that required by law to determine eligibility for participation in a program or for receiving financial assistance under such program).

Parents or students who believe their rights under PPRA may have been violated may file a complaint with ED by writing the Family Policy Compliance Office. Complaints must contain specific allegations of fact giving reasonable cause to believe that a violation of PPRA occurred. BULLYING

In order to promote a safe learning environment for all students, the Cole County R-I School District prohibits all forms of bullying. The district also prohibits reprisal or retaliation against any person who reports an act of bullying among or against students.

Definitions

Bullying -In accordance with state law, bullying is defined as intimidation, unwanted aggressive behavior, or harassment that is repetitive or is substantially likely to be repeated and causes a reasonable student to fear for his or her physical safety or property; that substantially interferes with the educational performance, opportunities or benefits of any student without exception; or that substantially disrupts the orderly operation of the school. Bullying includes, but is not limited to: physical actions, including violence, gestures, theft, or property damage; oral, written, or electronic communication, including name-calling, put-downs, extortion, or threats; or threats of reprisal or retaliation for reporting such acts.

Cyberbullying -A form of bullying committed by transmission of a communication including, but not limited to, a message, text, sound or image by means of an electronic device including, but not limited to, a telephone, wireless telephone or other wireless communication device, computer or pager.

- The district has jurisdiction over cyberbullying that uses the district's technology resources or that originates on district property, at a district activity or on district transportation. Even when cyberbullying does not involve district property, activities or technology resources, the district will impose consequences and discipline for those who engage in cyberbullying if there is a sufficient nexus to the educational environment, the behavior materially and substantially disrupts the educational environment, the communication involves a threat as defined by law, or the district is otherwise allowed by law to address the behavior.

School Day -A day on the school calendar when students are required to attend school.

Designated Officials -The principal of each building is hereby designated as the individual to receive and investigate reports of bullying. Each building principal shall designate at least two teachers or administrators in the building who are authorized to receive and investigate reports of bullying in the principal's absence or at the principal's discretion. The district compliance

officer appointed in policy AC will serve as the district wide anti bullying coordinator. The anti bullying coordinator will receive all completed investigative reports from all FILE: JFCF Critical 8 2016, Missouri School Boards' Association, Registered in U.S. Copyright Office Page 2 For Office Use Only: JFCF-C.1C (9/16) buildings and analyze the reports to identify any information that would inform the district's antidiscrimination and anti bullying education and training programs. In addition, the anti bullying coordinator will assist in making any relevant reports as required by state and federal law.

- Reporting Bullying - School employees, substitutes or volunteers are expected to intervene to prevent student bullying, appropriately discipline the perpetrator, assist the victim and report the incident to the building principal or designee for further investigation and action. Any school employee, substitute or volunteer who witnesses or has firsthand knowledge of bullying of a student must report the incident to the building principal or designee as soon as possible, but no later than two school days after the incident. Students who have been subjected to bullying, or who have witnessed or have knowledge of bullying, are encouraged to promptly report such incidents to a school employee. Any school employee receiving such a report shall promptly transmit the report to the building principal or designee.
- If the bullying incident involves students from more than one district building, the report should be made to the principal or designee of the building in which the incident took place or, if more appropriate, to the principal or designee of the building attended by the majority of the participants in the incident.

Investigation- Within two school days of receiving a report of bullying, the principal or designee will initiate an investigation of the incident. Reports that involve students from multiple buildings will be investigated cooperatively by the principals of each building involved, or those principals may request that the district's compliance officer designated in policy AC conduct the investigation.

- If at any time during the investigation the principal determines that the bullying involves illegal discrimination, harassment or retaliation as described in policy AC, the principal will report the incident to the compliance officer designated in that policy, who will assist in the investigation. If the alleged bullying involves a special education student or a student with disabilities, the principal will also notify the special education director. The investigation shall be completed within ten school days of the date the report of bullying was received unless good cause exists to extend the investigation.
- Upon completion of the investigation, the principal will decide whether bullying or harassment occurred and, if so, whether additional discipline is warranted in accordance with the district's student discipline code. The principal will generate a written report of the investigation and findings and send a copy of the completed report to the district's anti bullying coordinator. The principal or designee will document the report in the files FILE: JFCF Critical 8 2016, Missouri School Boards' Association, Registered in U.S. Copyright Office For Office Use Only: JFCF-C.1C (9/16) Page 3 of the victim and the alleged or actual perpetrator of bullying.
- **All reports will be kept confidential in accordance with state and federal law.**
- If the incident involved allegations of illegal discrimination or harassment, the principal's decision may be appealed in accordance with policy AC. Student discipline may be appealed when allowed by law in accordance with Board policy.
- The principal or other appropriate district staff will work with victims and their families to access resources and services to help them deal with any negative effects that resulted from the incident.

Consequences- Students who participate in bullying or who retaliate against anyone who reports bullying will be disciplined in accordance with the district's discipline code. Such discipline may include detention, in-school suspension, out-of-school suspension, expulsion, removal from participation in activities, exclusion from honors and awards, and other consequences deemed appropriate by the principal or superintendent. The district will also contact law enforcement when required by law or notify social media companies of inappropriate online activity when appropriate. Even in situations where the district does not have jurisdiction to discipline a student for bullying, such as when the acts take place off campus and there is an insufficient nexus to the district, the principal or designee will take appropriate actions to assist student victims.

- Such actions may include, but are not limited to, contacting the parents/guardians of the victim and the alleged perpetrators, communicating that this behavior is not allowed on district grounds or at district activities, notifying the appropriate district staff to assist the victim, and taking additional action when appropriate, such as notifying law enforcement or social media companies of inappropriate online activity.
- District employees and substitutes who violate this policy will be disciplined or terminated. Discipline may include suspension with or without pay, a negative evaluation, prohibition from being on district property or at district activities, mandated training or other appropriate remedial action.
- Volunteers who violate this policy will no longer be permitted to volunteer.

Missouri Revised Statutes

Chapter 160: Schools—General Provisions – Section 160.455

Duties of school district:

160.455. At the beginning of each school year, each school district in the state shall distribute to each student such materials that have been prepared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the state emergency management agency or by agencies that are authorities in the area of earthquake safety and that provide the following objectives:

1. Developing public awareness regarding the causes of earthquakes, the forces and effects of earthquakes, and the need for school and community action in coping with earthquake hazards.
2. Promoting understanding of the impact of earthquakes on natural features and manmade structures; and
3. Explaining what safety measures should be taken by individuals and households prior to, during and following an earthquake.

Student Drug Testing (Grades 9-12)

The Board recognizes the importance of protecting the health and safety of students from the use of illegal drugs, performance-enhancing drugs and alcohol. The purpose of this policy is to help prevent substance abuse among students, to encourage treatment for students with substance abuse problems and to ensure that students have the opportunity to attend school and participate in activities in a fair, safe and healthy environment. The district will randomly select participating students for drug testing periodically throughout the school year. The random selection process will result in an equal probability that any participating student could be chosen. Students should refer to policy JFCI-AP1.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Professional Learning Communities (PLC)

The Cole R-I School District has committed to implement the PLC model beginning the 2010-2011 school year. This means teachers, staff, and administrators are committed to successful learning for every student. Teachers focus on improving student achievement using regularly-scheduled collaboration time. This will result in an **early-dismissal time at 2:29 p.m. on every Thursday throughout the school year**. Teachers clarify exactly what must be learned by each student and frequently evaluate their progress through the use of formative and summative assessments. They also ensure interventions are in place for those who need extra time and provide enrichment activities for students who have already reached their goals. Through best teaching practices and active learning, students are engaged in the learning process and are provided feedback about their performance.

Philosophy of the Cole County R-I School District

It is the philosophy of the Cole County R-I School District to provide an educational environment that will ensure a positive atmosphere for the intellectual, social, physical, and moral development of the students in the district. General Regulations

Students should not be in the halls prior to 7:50 a.m. unless they have a scheduled meeting with a staff member. Students who arrive early should wait in the cafeteria until this time.

Students are not to leave school grounds once they arrive, unless they have a pass from the office allowing them to do so.

Anyone leaving school without office permission will be considered truant. Students that arrive in vehicles must immediately enter the building.

Students that have a permit to leave school should do so within 5 minutes from the time on the pass and should not return to school until they are ready to attend class.

Students should clear the building by 3:40 p.m. unless supervised by a staff member.

Other Times

The building will not be opened outside of school hours unless a faculty member is present, or an adult approved by the Superintendent or Principal. The Superintendent or Principal must approve use of the building outside of regular school hours.

Lockers/Backpacks

All students will be allowed to use a hall locker. Locks will be available to rent for \$2.00 a school year. The student will pay for lost or damaged locks (\$5.00 fee). Students are strongly advised not to share their combinations with others. All school lockers will be searched at the discretion of the administration. There should be no assumption of privacy concerning school lockers. The administration must have the ability to search lockers to ensure tidiness, to look for inappropriate items being stored in lockers, and to help fight theft at the school. All students are encouraged to store belongings in lockers.

The school will also have locks available to rent at a cost of \$2.00 for gym lockers. The gym lockers may be used with the same understanding as the hall lockers concerning discretionary searches. Gym bags, tote bags, and/or backpacks should not be left unattended in the locker room.

Visitors

The public is encouraged to visit our school and is required to check in at the junior high/high school office upon arrival. Students must make arrangements in advance if they wish to bring a guest to school. The guest must be visiting with the intent of enrolling at Russellville Junior High/High School.

School Closings / Late Start / Snow Routes

Local radio stations, as well as Indian Text Alert, will be notified by 6:30 a.m. when we are not having school. If Russellville is not included in the list of school closings, then one can be sure we will have school. Late start notification will be alerted by 9:00 p.m. prior to a late start. School will begin at 10:00. No breakfast will be served on late start days.

Attendance

The Public School Law of Missouri 167.031 states: "Every parent, guardian, or other person in this state having charge, control or custody of a child between the ages of six and sixteen shall cause the child to attend some day school, public, private, parochial, or parish, not less than the entire school term of the school which the child attends."

The school system realizes that medical and dental appointments, death of a family member, and illness are legitimate reasons for being absent. If a student has been absent for any of these reasons, he/she should obtain verified documentation to excuse the absence.

Whenever a student is absent from school, a parent must call the principal's office before 10:00 A.M. If this is not possible, on the day of return the student must present to the principal's office (before the first hour bell rings) a written excuse from the parents, which is dated and states the reason for the absence. When an absence has been excused, the student bears the responsibility of obtaining and making up missed assignments due to the absence. One day for each day of absence is allowed to make up the missed work. **No homework will be accepted after the 6th unverified absence.**

Any student who is absent from class for more than 6 days, for any reason, in one semester may be denied credit in that course.

"SKIP DAY" IS NOT AUTHORIZED OR APPROVED BY THE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION. All students need to be in school every day possible. The threat of accidents and loss of educational opportunities is a concern of the professional staff of the Cole R-I School District.

In order to compete, attend, or perform in a student activity, students must be in attendance at least 4 class periods on the day of the activity, unless excused by the principal. Students missing school for an activity are responsible to procure their assignments for the classes missed and have work completed on time.

When a student is absent due to a planned family vacation/leave the student must make arrangements with all his/her teachers before he/she leaves. The work will be due upon return.

During the post high school planning process, students are encouraged to visit college campuses. Students are allowed 2 college visits during their junior year and 2 college visits during their senior year. Students are required to provide verification of their college visit.

Appeal Process

If credit is denied due to excessive absences, students may appeal, in writing, to the attendance committee to recover the credit. The attendance committee will consist of the junior high/high school principal, the counselor, and three staff members. If the attendance committee upholds the loss of credit, the student may appeal to the superintendent. If this appeal is unsuccessful, the student may make a final appeal to the Board of Education.

ACADEMICS

Schedules and Schedule Changes

Students will be allowed to change their schedule during the summer and during the first three days of the first semester. Because the student and parent assist with the scheduling and to ensure that teaching and learning take place in a timely manner, students will not be allowed to change their schedule after the 3rd day of the first semester. Second semester schedule changes will be permitted during the first three days. Again, this is to ensure that teaching and learning take place in a timely manner. All schedule changes will require permission from the parents, teachers, and the counselor.

*ITV course deadlines are subject to the ITV handbook.

Method of Determining Grades

When calculating quarter grades, a percentage of total possible points should be used to determine the quarter grade. The percentages are listed below:

Cole R-I High School will operate on a 80/20 grading scale. A student's grade will be based on:

1. 80% - assessments and major projects, labs, and research
2. 20% - homework and classwork

The semester grade will be calculated by averaging the quarter grades within each semester plus an additional 15% final exam.

Assessment Retakes may be offered by the teacher. This procedure will be outlined in their course syllabus.

A maximum of 5 credits of weighted courses may be applied to determine GPA. Weighted courses taken beyond this maximum will be taken at normal weight.

Students enrolled in special education classes must successfully complete a program compatible with their needs and abilities. Each program shall follow graduation requirements. The determination of the need for classroom accommodations and/or modified grades will be made for each student through his/her individual education plan (IEP). Modified grades will be weighted for GPA/class rank and noted on the transcript.

Honor Roll

To qualify for the honor roll, you must be enrolled in at least four classes. To qualify for the "Principal's Honor Roll" a student must earn a minimum GPA of 3.75. To qualify for the "Honor Roll" a student must earn a GPA of 3.5. To qualify for the "Honorable Mention Honor Roll" a student must earn a 3.25.

Homework Policy

Guidelines for the Assignment of Homework and *Responsibilities of Students, Staff and Parents*

I. Purpose:

Homework contributes toward building responsibility, self-discipline and lifelong learning habits. It is the intention of the Russellville Junior High/High School staff to assign relevant, challenging and meaningful homework assignments that reinforce classroom learning objectives. Homework should provide students with the opportunity to apply information they have learned, complete unfinished class assignments, and develop independence. Homework grades are modified based on students' individual needs (i.e. IEP, 504 Plans).

Homework assignments include:

- **Practice** exercises to follow classroom instruction
- **Preview** assignments to prepare for subsequent lessons
- **Extension** assignments to transfer new skills or concepts to new situations
- **Creative** activities to integrate many skills toward the production of a response or product

II. Time

Actual time required to complete assignments will vary with each student's study habits, academic skills, and selected course load. If your child is spending an inordinate amount of time doing homework, you should contact your child's teachers. Students are encouraged to pursue non-assigned, independent, leisure reading.

III. Late Work Policy

It is the belief of Cole R-I school district that all students can learn at high levels. In order to learn at high levels, students must practice the skills needed for assessments before the assessments take place. Through homework, class work, and projects, students are able to practice skills needed to meet learning objectives. Our policy for late work is that it will be accepted if the student has met the requirements. Homework must be completed before the test is given. All incomplete homework will not receive credit after the test is taken.

IV. Major Projects

Major Projects include research reports, book reports, major essays, and other assignments teachers designate as major projects.

Responsibilities of Staff:

- Assign relevant, challenging and meaningful homework that reinforces classroom learning
- Give clear instructions and make sure students understand the purpose
- Give feedback and/or correct homework
- Communicate with other teachers
- Involve parents and contact them if a pattern of late or incomplete homework develops
- Provide samples of projects for students to refer to

Responsibilities of Parents:

- Set a regular, uninterrupted study time each day
- Establish a quiet, well-lit study area
- Monitor students organization and daily list of assignments in their agenda
- Help student work to find the answer, not just get it done
- Be supportive when the student gets frustrated with difficult assignments
- Contact teacher to stay informed about the student's learning process

Responsibilities of Students:

- Write down assignments in the student planner
- Be sure all assignments are clear; don't be afraid to ask questions if necessary
- Set aside a regular time for studying
- Take notes in classes and work on summarizing information for understanding
- Work on homework independently whenever possible, so that it reflects student ability
- Produce quality work
- Make sure assignments are done according to the given instructions and completed on time

V. RTI

In order to ensure students do not get too far behind, we have research-based interventions in place to ensure student success. Teachers will meet in grade-level RTI teams to review teacher referrals. A student can be referred for a number of reasons from struggling with grades to behavior concerns. A student does not have to be failing to be referred. Any student who does not appear to be performing at their expected level may be referred. The grade level teams will determine what intervention a student might need. The Intervention Coordinator (Administration/Counselor) will discuss the decision of the grade level team with the student and let him/her know the why and when.

Organizational meetings will only be allowed on the 1st Friday of the month unless approved by the administration.

Finals

All students are required to take semester finals. Finals are worth 15% of the semester grade.

School Counselor

The Russellville Junior High/High School Counseling Program is predicated on the understanding that each student is a unique, developing, capable individual who will learn from experience and grow personally, socially and educationally throughout adolescence. Comprehensive school counseling services are designed to meet the needs of all students and to assist in developing positive attitudes/skills in the areas of self-awareness, interpersonal relations, educational and career awareness, goal setting and decision making. In addition to providing necessary and important educational and career information, the counselor seeks to promote each student's desire to maximize his/her potential in preparation for success in his/her post high school plan.

Counseling promotes effective communication and life planning skills, which help students to grow into responsible adults.

Early Graduation

Students who wish to petition the School Board of Education for early graduation must do so by September 30th. Applications received after September 30th will not be considered. Students must have completed 7 semesters, 25 units, and met all requirements of the state and of the Cole R-I School Board. If approved, individuals will no longer be considered a Cole R-I student. In doing so, a student will no longer be allowed to participate in school sponsored activities, except in those cases where guests are approved to attend. Early graduates will not be considered for Valedictorian or Salutatorian honors. Their rank in class will be allowed for scholarship purposes. Early graduates will be allowed to participate in the graduation ceremony. All students that wish to graduate early must complete all required TSAs, EOCs, and all other required tests. Students must be enrolled in college coursework or be employed on a full-time basis. If you elect to graduate early, you will not be allowed on campus during the school day after early completion without permission.

Graduation Ceremony

All students are required to meet graduation requirements prior to participation in graduation ceremonies. The junior high/high school principal, in consultation with the high school counselor, shall certify that each student has met graduation requirements. Students are not allowed to modify the graduation cap/gown in any way without the approval of administration.

Withdrawal from School

Anyone transferring to another school or withdrawing for any reason must turn in all school property in his/her care and pay all fees due before credits will be transferred or released.

Nichols Career Center

Students who qualify academically may fill out an application for attending Nichols Career Center at Jefferson City High School. Students who are interested in vocational training and are on track to graduate can make arrangements through the counselor's office to attend Nichols during their junior and senior years only. **Students are required to finish the course assignments. Students not completing a full semester of coursework will be required to reimburse the Cole R-I School District the cost of tuition.**

Specific legal requirements for a high school diploma must be met: All students must pass the United States and Missouri Constitution test, Civics requirement, and CPR training prior to graduation.

Student Classification

Student Debt

Student debt includes, but is not limited to, library fines, class dues, lunch balances, or any other fine. Failure to pay the debt could result in loss of student parking privileges and/or student activities.

STUDENT BEHAVIOR CODE

We believe the achievement of self-discipline is an important goal of our school. The following behavior code is designed to guide Russellville students in the attainment of this goal.

Student Expectations:

- Conduct themselves at all times in the manner of young ladies and young gentlemen with respect for themselves and others.
- Attend school regularly.
- Be on time to school and class with the proper materials, remain attentive in class, display proper classroom and hall behavior and remain in the class unless dismissed by your teacher.
- Do assigned work to the best of your ability.
- Be courteous to teachers and fellow students.
- No food or drink in the classroom. No food parties unless approved by administration. Water may be allowed in classrooms and must be in a container with a clear lid.
- Refrain from using the teacher workroom without permission from the office.
- Drive in a prudent and safe manner.
- BE A GOOD SPORT AT ALL ACTIVITIES, HOME AND AWAY. REMEMBER, EACH STUDENT REPRESENTS RUSSELLVILLE JUNIOR HIGH/HIGH SCHOOL AT ALL TIMES. Student spectators are expected to sit and watch during activities. Attendance privileges will be suspended if this rule is not followed.

- Corporal punishment
- Lunch Detention

Russellville Junior High/High School Discipline Code

Academic Dishonesty

Cheating on tests, assignments, projects or similar activities; plagiarism; claiming credit for another person's work; fabrication of facts, sources or other supporting material; unauthorized collaboration; facilitating academic dishonesty; and other misconduct related to academics.

First Offense:	No credit for the work, grade reduction, or replacement assignment.
Subsequent Offense:	No credit for the work, grade reduction, course failure, or removal from extracurricular activities.

Arson Starting or attempting to start a fire, or causing or attempting to cause an explosion.

First Offense:	Detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion. Restitution if appropriate.
Subsequent Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion. Restitution if appropriate.

Assault

1. Using physical force, such as hitting, striking or pushing, to cause or attempt to cause physical injury; placing another person in apprehension of immediate physical injury; recklessly engaging in conduct that creates a grave risk of death or serious physical injury; causing physical contact with another person knowing the other person will regard the contact as offensive or provocative; or any other act that constitutes criminal assault in the third or fourth degree.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

2. Knowingly causing or attempting to cause serious physical injury or death to another person, recklessly causing serious physical injury to another person, or any other act that constitutes assault in the first or second degree.

First Offense:	10-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	Expulsion.

Automobile/Vehicle Misuse: Uncourteous or unsafe driving on or around district property, unregistered parking, failure to move vehicle at the request of school officials, failure to follow directions given by school officials or failure to follow established rules for parking or driving on district property.

First Offense:	Suspension or revocation of parking privileges, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Revocation of parking privileges, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

Bullying and Cyberbullying (see policy 2655) Intimidation, unwanted aggressive behavior, or harassment that is repetitive or is substantially likely to be repeated and causes a reasonable student to fear for his or her physical safety or property; that substantially interferes with the educational performance, opportunities or benefits of any student without exception; or that substantially disrupts the orderly operation of the school. Bullying includes, but is not limited to: physical actions, including violence, gestures, theft or property damage; oral, written or electronic communication, including name-calling, put-downs, extortion or threats; or threats of reprisal or retaliation for reporting such acts. Cyberbullying is a form of bullying committed by transmission of a communication including, but not limited to, a message, text, sound or image by means of an electronic device including, but not limited to, a telephone, wireless telephone or other wireless communication device, computer or pager.

First Offense:	Detention, in-school suspension, or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Bus or Transportation Misconduct Any offense committed by a student on transportation provided by or through the district shall be punished in the same manner as if the offense had been committed at the student's assigned school. In addition, transportation privileges may be suspended or revoked.

Dishonesty Any act of lying, whether verbal or written, including forgery.

First Offense:	Nullification of forged document. Principal/Student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Nullification of forged document. Detention, in-school suspension, or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.

Displacement of student- Student is at school but not in the proper location.

- 1st Offense - 1-2 days ASD, 1-2 days Saturday school, 1-3 days lunch detention, parents contacted
- 2nd Offense - 1-3 days ISS, 1-2 days Saturday school, parents contacted
- 3rd Offense - 1-10 days ISS, Saturday school, lunch detention, parents contacted

Disruptive or Demeaning Language or Conduct - Use of hate language to demean other persons due to the race, gender, disability, natural origin, or religious beliefs. This provision also includes conduct, verbal, written, or symbolic speech which materially and substantially disrupts class, school activities, transportation, or school functions.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Dress Code Violation—Failure to comply with student dress code

- 1 st Offense—Warning, student will immediately comply with dress code, 1-3 hours ASD
- 2 nd Offense—2-3 days ASD, 1-10 days ISS, parent contacted
- Subsequent Offense—1-10 days ISS, 1-5 days OSS, parent contacted

Drugs/Alcohol/Controlled Substance

1. Possession, sale, purchase or distribution of any over-the-counter drug, herbal preparation or imitation drug or herbal preparation.

First Offense:	In-school suspension or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

2. Possession of or attendance while under the influence of or soon after consuming any unauthorized prescription drug, alcohol, narcotic substance, unauthorized inhalants, counterfeit drugs, imitation controlled substances or drug-related paraphernalia, including controlled substances and illegal drugs defined as substances identified under schedules I, II, III, IV or V in section 202(c) of the Controlled Substances Act.

First Offense:	In-school suspension or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	11-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

3. Sale, purchase or distribution of any prescription drug, alcohol, narcotic substance, unauthorized inhalants, counterfeit drugs, imitation controlled substances or drug-related paraphernalia, including controlled substances and illegal drugs defined as substances identified under schedules I, II, III, IV or V in section 202(c) of the Controlled Substances Act.

First Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	11-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Extortion Threatening or intimidating any person for the purpose of obtaining money or anything of value.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Failure to Care for or Return District Property Loss of, failure to return, or damage to district property including, but not limited to, books, computers, calculators, uniforms, and sporting and instructional equipment.

First Offense:	Restitution. Principal/Student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Restitution. Detention or in-school suspension.

Failure to Meet Conditions of Suspension, Expulsion or Other Disciplinary Consequences Violating the conditions of a suspension, expulsion or other disciplinary consequence including, but not limited to, participating in or attending any district-sponsored activity or being on or near district property or the location where a district activity is held. See the section of this regulation titled, "Conditions of Suspension, Expulsion and Other Disciplinary Consequences."

As required by law, when the district considers suspending a student for an additional period of time or expelling a student for being on or within 1,000 feet of district property during a suspension, consideration shall be given to whether the student poses a threat to the safety of any child or school employee and whether the student's presence is disruptive to the educational process or undermines the effectiveness of the district's discipline policy.

First Offense:	Verbal warning, detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion. Report to law enforcement for trespassing if expelled.
Subsequent Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion. Report to law enforcement for trespassing if expelled.

False Alarms Tampering with emergency equipment, setting off false alarms, making false reports; communicating a threat or false report for the purpose of frightening or disturbing people, disrupting the educational environment or causing the evacuation or closure of district property.

First Offense:	Restitution. Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	Restitution. In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Fighting Mutual combat in which both parties have contributed to the conflict either verbally or by physical action.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Gambling Betting on an uncertain outcome, regardless of stakes; engaging in any game of chance or activity in which something of real or symbolic value may be won or lost. Gambling includes, but is not limited to, betting on outcomes of activities, assignments, contests and games.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, loss of privileges, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Principal/Student conference, loss of privileges, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

Harassment, including Sexual Harassment

1. Use of material of a sexual nature or unwelcome verbal, written or symbolic language based on gender, race, color, religion, sex, national origin, ancestry, disability or any other characteristic protected by law. Examples of illegal harassment include, but are not limited to, racial jokes or comments; requests for sexual favors and other unwelcome sexual advances; graffiti; name calling; or threatening, intimidating or hostile acts based on a protected characteristic.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

2. Unwelcome physical contact of a sexual nature or that is based on gender, race, color, religion, sex, national origin, ancestry, disability or any other characteristic protected by law. Examples include, but are not limited to, touching or fondling of the genital areas, breasts or undergarments, regardless of whether the touching occurred through or under clothing; or pushing or fighting based on protected characteristics.

First Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Hazing Any activity that a reasonable person believes would negatively impact the mental or physical health or safety of a student or put the student in a ridiculous, humiliating, stressful or disconcerting position for the purposes of initiation, affiliation, admission, membership or maintenance of membership in any group, class, organization, club or athletic team including, but not limited to, a grade level, student organization or district-sponsored activity. Hazing can occur even when all students involved are willing participants.

First Offense:	In-school suspension or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Incendiary Devices or Fireworks Possessing, displaying or using matches, lighters or other devices used to start fires unless required as part of an educational exercise and supervised by district staff; possessing or using fireworks.

First Offense:	Confiscation. Warning, principal/student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Confiscation. Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

Defiance of Authority - Refusal to obey directions or defiance of staff authority.

- 1 st Offense—1-10 days ISS, parents contacted, loss of privileges
- 2 nd Offense—1-10 days ISS, 1-5 days OSS, parents contacted, loss of privileges
- 3 rd Offense—1-10 days ISS, 1-10 days OSS, parents contacted
- Subsequent Offense— 1-10 days OSS, parents contacted.

Disruptive Behavior - Conduct which has the intentional effect of disturbing education or the safe transportation of a student

First Offense:	Warning, principal/student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

Nuisance Items Possession or use of items such as toys, games, and portable media players that are not authorized for educational purposes.

First Offense:	Confiscation. Warning, principal/student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Confiscation. Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

Profanity

- 1st Offense—Warning issued, 1-3 days ISS, parents contacted.
- 2nd Offense—1-3 days ISS, parents contacted.
- 3rd Offense—1-10 days ISS, 1-5 days OSS, parents contacted.
- Subsequent Offense—1-10 days ISS, 1-10 days OSS, parents contacted.

Improper Display of Affection - Consensual kissing, fondling, or embracing

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

Sexting and/or Possession of Sexually Explicit, Vulgar or Violent Material Students may not possess or display, electronically or otherwise, sexually explicit, vulgar or violent material including, but not limited to, pornography or depictions of nudity, violence or explicit death or injury. This prohibition does not apply to curricular material that has been approved by district staff for its educational value. Students will not be disciplined for speech in situations where it is protected by law.

First Offense:	Confiscation. Principal/Student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Confiscation. Detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Sexual Activity Consensual acts of sex or consensual simulations of sex including, but not limited to, intercourse or oral or manual stimulation.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Indecent Exposure Includes display of breasts, buttocks and / or genitals in a public location

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Tardy—Failure to be in assigned classroom when the tardy bell rings._

- 1st offense —principal conference (3 accumulative tardies in a semester)
- 2nd offense — 2 days ASD (4 accumulative tardies in a semester)
- 3rd offense — 2 days ISS (5 accumulative tardies in a semester)
- 4th offense — 3 days ISS (6 accumulative tardies in a semester)
- 5th offense — 3-5 days ISS (7 accumulative tardies in a semester)
- 6^{th+} offense — 5-10 days ISS or 1-3 days OSS (8 accumulative tardies in a semester)

Technology Misconduct (see Board policies EHB and KKB and procedure EHB-AP1)

1. Attempting, regardless of success, to: gain unauthorized access to a technology system or information; use district technology to connect to other systems in evasion of the physical limitations of the remote system; copy district files without authorization; interfere with the ability of others to utilize district technology; secure a higher level of privilege without authorization; introduce computer viruses, hacking tools, or other disruptive/destructive programs onto or using district technology; or evade or disable a filtering/blocking device.

First Offense:	Restitution. Principal/Student conference, loss of user privileges, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Restitution. Loss of user privileges, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion

2. Using, displaying or turning on pagers, phones, personal digital assistants, personal laptops or any other personal electronic devices during the regular school day, or instructional class time, unless the use is part of the instructional program, required by a district-sponsored class or activity, or otherwise permitted by the building principal.

First Offense:	Confiscation, principal/student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Confiscation, principal/student conference, detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion. Parent pick up device from school.

3. Violations, other than those listed in (1) or (2) above, of Board policy EHB, procedure EHB-AP1 or any policy or procedure regulating student use of personal electronic devices.

First Offense:	Restitution. Principal/Student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Restitution. Loss of user privileges, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

4. Use of audio or visual recording equipment in violation of Board policy KKB.

First Offense:	Confiscation. Principal/Student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Confiscation. Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

Theft, attempted theft or knowing possession of stolen property.

First Offense:	Return of or restitution for property. Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Return of or restitution for property. 1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Threatening Language-Use of verbal, physical or written threats to do bodily harm to person or personal property.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Tobacco

1. Possession of any tobacco products, electronic cigarettes or other nicotine-delivery products on district property, district transportation or at any district activity. Nicotine patches or other medications used in a tobacco cessation program may only be possessed in accordance with district policy JHCD.

First Offense:	Confiscation of prohibited product. Principal/Student conference, detention, or in-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Confiscation of prohibited product. Detention, in-school suspension, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

2. Use of any tobacco products, electronic cigarettes, or other nicotine-delivery products on district property, district transportation or at any district activity. Nicotine patches or other medications used in a tobacco cessation program may only be used in accordance with district policy JHCD.

First Offense:	Confiscation of prohibited product. Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-3 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	Confiscation of prohibited product. In-school suspension or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension.

Truancy - Absent from class or classes without authorization (See also Policy and Regulation 2340 - Truancy and Educational Neglect.)

- 1 st Offense—1-5 days ISS, parents contacted.
- 2 nd Offense—1-10 days ISS, parents contacted.
- 3 rd Offense—1-10 days ISS, parents contacted, reported to SRO.
- Subsequent Offense—1-10 days OSS, parents contacted, reported to SRO.

Unauthorized Entry Entering or assisting any other person to enter a district facility, office, locker, or other area that is locked or not open to the general public; entering or assisting any other person to enter a district facility through an unauthorized entrance; assisting unauthorized persons to enter a district facility through any entrance.

First Offense:	Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension.
Subsequent Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Vandalism Intentional damage or attempt to damage property belonging to the staff, students, or the District..

First Offense:	Restitution. Principal/Student conference, detention, in-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	Restitution. In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Weapons/Firearms (Refer to Policy and Regulation 2620 - Firearms and Weapons in School)

1. Possession or use of any weapon as defined in Board policy, other than those defined in 18 U.S.C. ' 921, 18 U.S.C. ' 930(g)(2) or ' 571.010, RSMo.

First Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

2. Possession or use of a firearm as defined in 18 U.S.C. ' 921 or any instrument or device defined in ' 571.010, RSMo., or any instrument or device defined as a dangerous weapon in 18 U.S.C. ' 930(g)(2).

First Offense:	One calendar year suspension or expulsion, unless modified by the Board upon recommendation by the superintendent.
Subsequent Offense:	Expulsion.

3. Possession or use of ammunition or a component of a weapon.

First Offense:	In-school suspension, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.
Subsequent Offense:	1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Weapons in policy include: a blackjack, concealable firearm, firearm, firearm silencer, explosive weapon, gas gun, knife, knuckles, machine gun, projectile weapon, rifle, shotgun, spring gun, switchblade knife.

Any student discipline problems that are not covered by the disciplinary code will be handled at the discretion of the principal. Discretion may also be used in extreme cases of misconduct.

Reporting Requirements:

Administrators are required by law to report certain felony offenses to law enforcement officials. Administrators are also required to report, on a need to know basis, acts of violence. The Safe Schools Act of 1996 requires teachers, administrators, and law enforcement officials to respond to acts of violence.

Those reportable offenses include murder, kidnapping, assault, rape, sodomy, burglary, robbery, distribution of drugs, possession of drugs, arson, manslaughter, felonious restraint, property damage, weapons possession (including weapons carried in a weapons rack inside a vehicle).

Personal Appearance/Dress Code

Personal appearance should not disrupt the educational process, violate federal, state, or local health or obscenity laws, or affect the welfare and safety of the student or his/her classmates. SPECIFIC DRESS RULES INCLUDE:

- No clothing that might be perceived as sexually suggestive will be permitted
- No clothing advertising drugs, alcohol, tobacco, or with profanity will be permitted.
- No abbreviated tops, muscle shirts or spaghetti strap dresses will be permitted. Tank tops must have two inch or wider seams on the shoulders. Sleeveless shirts must have a finished hem (no ripped or torn edges are allowed). NO BARE MIDRIFTS. NO BARE SHOULDERS.
- **No hats, caps, or headgear are to be worn in school**
- Sunglasses are not permitted.
- Skirts and shorts should be mid-thigh.
- No "Low Rider"/"Sagging" shorts or pants will be permitted.
- No pajama bottoms will be permitted. No Blankets in hallways or classrooms.
- No chains will be permitted.

Students who violate the school dress code will be asked to change. Violation of dress code will result in a parent call and disciplinary action as dictated in the student handbook. Students are encouraged to be leaders and dress for success at school each day. Respect to themselves and others should always come first when representing Russellville Junior High/High School.

After-School Detention (ASD)

After-School Detention is designated for minor acts of misconduct and allows students to continue in their regular school day with no loss of credit or class time.

- ASD will meet from 3:35pm-4:35pm on assigned days.
- Students are responsible for transportation after detention.
- Students are to be on time and required to stay the duration or face the likelihood of more ASD.

In-School-Suspension (ISS)

In-School-Suspension is a program designed to discipline students that choose not to follow the Cole R-I Discipline Code. ISS is an alternative to Out-Of-School suspension. Students that are assigned to ISS should be aware that this isolation punishment is a step before actual suspension from school. This program was established in an effort to keep students in school as much as possible. During ISS students will do the following:

- Complete all assignments from their classes.
- Work done during ISS will receive **full credit**.
- Work on any assigned task administered by the ISS teacher.
- Be isolated from the student body entirely.
- Students attending Nichols Career Center or engaged in work-study will remain at Russellville for the duration of the suspension.
- Students assigned to ISS will not be allowed to participate in extra-curricular or co-curricular activities on the assigned day if it is a suspension that is more than one school day. (i.e. 1. Student is assigned one day ISS. Suspension is 8:00am to 3:29pm. At that time, the suspension is over. 2. Student is assigned two or more days of ISS. Suspension is from 8:00am on day 1 to 3:29p.m. on the last day. At that point, any school activities that take place during the suspension time **are not** to be participated in by the student. They may participate at the end of the school suspension day.)

Out of School Suspension (OSS)

Out-of-School Suspension is meant as a last resort to correct misbehavior. Students serving OSS will not be allowed on school premises or at any school related function until the suspension has been fully served.

- Students serving OSS may request his/her assignments for the duration of the suspension.
- Work done during OSS will receive **no credit**.
- Students attending Nichols Career Center who are suspended at either Russellville or Nichols Career Center will be suspended at both.
- Days of OSS will count against the student in regards to the attendance policy.

Saturday School

The Saturday School program is designed to deter specific behavior problems. Hours for Saturday school are from 8:00am to 12:00pm.

Procedure

- Students are responsible for their own transportation.
- Students will not speak to any other student or the instructor without permission.
- Students are responsible for bringing all study materials and assignments.
- Students will not be allowed to sleep.
- No food or drink will be allowed.
- No headsets, electronic equipment, games, etc. are allowed. Only appropriate educational items are allowed. NO CELL PHONES or electronic devices are allowed during Saturday School.
- Rescheduling of Saturday School will be done only one time during the school year with notification from parent to the building administrator.
 - Failure to attend or removal from Saturday School will result in two (2) days ISS. If there is a second occurrence, it will result in four (4) days ISS. Any occurrence thereafter will result in two (2) days OSS.

Telephone

Telephone calls are to be limited to EMERGENCY calls only and are to be made from the principal's office with office permission between classes or before and after school.

Reward

There is an extending \$100.00 reward for information leading to the apprehension and conviction of anyone committing vandalism on school grounds or property.

Corporal Punishment

Corporal punishment, as a measure of correction or of maintaining discipline and order in schools, is permitted. Corporal punishment can be used any time during the discipline procedure. If found necessary and/or requested, it will be administered by the principal in the presence of a teacher. It should never be inflicted in the presence of other pupils or without a witness.

Corporal punishment shall be administered only by swatting the buttocks with a paddle. When it becomes necessary to use corporal punishment, it shall be administered so that there can be no chance of bodily injury or harm. Striking a student on the head or face is not permitted.

The teacher or principal shall submit a report to the superintendent explaining the reason for the use of corporal punishment as well as the details of the administration of the same.

A staff member may, however, use reasonable physical force against a student without advance notice to the principal, if it is essential for self-defense, for the preservation of order, or for the protection of other persons or the property of the school district. This student disciplinary code was developed in accordance with the requirements of House Bill 463 of the 83rd General Assembly. Section 5, which pertains to the code, is quoted below:

Section 5.1 The local board of education of each school district shall establish a policy of discipline, a written copy of which shall be made available in the office of the superintendent of such district, during normal business hours, for public inspection.

1. The policy shall contain the consequences of failure to obey standards of conduct set by the local board of education, and the importance of the standards to the maintenance of an atmosphere where orderly learning is possible and encouraged.
2. All school district personnel responsible for the care and supervision of students are authorized to hold every pupil strictly accountable for any disorderly conduct in school or on any property of the school, on any school bus going to or returning from school, during school-sponsored activities, or during intermission or recess periods.
3. Teachers and other authorized district personnel in public schools responsible for the care, supervision, and discipline of school children, including volunteers selected with reasonable care by the school district, shall not be civilly liable when acting in conformity with the established policy of discipline developed by each board under this section.

Any student, who has been suspended from school on two (2) previous occasions, shall have his record reviewed by the administrative staff for a recommendation to the Superintendent and the Board of Education for a long-term suspension from school upon the student's third (3) suspension.

The administrative staff may refer students to other agencies to include but not limited to: juvenile division, division of family services, Ozark Care and Counseling.

The school always reserves the right to remove immediately from class or school any student whose presence constitutes a danger to any student or school staff member, threatens the orderly conduct of the school, or is in violation of state statutes or city ordinances.

Referrals of a student to the office of the principal for misconduct may be considered sufficient reason to declare a student ineligible to participate in extracurricular school activities. A single serious breach of good conduct, either in or out of school, may also be sufficient cause for declaring a student ineligible to participate in school activities.

EXTRA & CO-CURRICULAR

Athletics/Activities

- In order to participate in interscholastic activities, students must meet the standards of the Missouri State High School Activities Association. Students not judged good citizens by the faculty will not be permitted to participate. The coaches will make such rules as are deemed necessary. ALL STUDENTS MUST HAVE A C- AVERAGE AND PASS ALL COURSES IN A GRADING PERIOD TO PARTICIPATE. If a student has been declared academically ineligible, **then the student cannot participate until the next grade period.** (Exception: The student may become eligible if he/she brings that **same letter** grade to passing. If the letter grade falls back to failing during that same period, the student will become ineligible until the end of the grading period.) If the student meets the academic requirements at the end of the period, then the player will be eligible again. Grade checks will be roughly every four weeks. The administration will be looking at the **SEMESTER** grade at each grade check.
- Athletic participation is voluntary.
- Students attending games must refrain from engaging in any conduct that degrades Russellville School. "Booing" is one of the most serious examples of poor conduct and sportsmanship.
- Admission to athletic events is \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for students.*Regular gate fees are capped at \$10.00 for immediate family households per each sporting event. (* MSHSAA sets ticket prices for district and state level games.)

Physical Exams

A current physical exam must be on file with the athletic department. Physical exams by a physician of your choice are required before a student can participate in interscholastic sports (practices and/or contests). Any physical on file is good for 2 years (730) days from the date it was performed.

Transportation to and from school activities

Students being transported to a supervised activity must ride on the designated transportation both going and returning.

Exceptions:

- A student may ride to and or from an activity with a parent or another participating parent if his/her parent agrees and notifies the sponsor in writing at least 24 hours before the activity. Sponsors should call and confirm with the parent.
- A student may get on and off the transportation at a point designated by a parent if the sponsor is notified by parent and the designated point is in route. No student shall be let off the transportation at this point unless the home they are going to is on or near the road or a designated person is waiting to meet the student.
- Students may return from an activity with parent(s) or designated adult with written permission from the parent or guardian for each occasion. The adult who is assuming responsibility for the student must sign him/her out.

Other Considerations

- All transportation requests must be approved by the sponsor.
- Students should not arrive more than ten minutes before the bus is scheduled to leave. Sponsors should arrive at least fifteen minutes before departure.
- Boys and girls are not allowed to sit with one another unless the sponsor's approval is obtained prior to the trip.
- All other rules above pertain to transportation to and from school activities.

Class Officers and Club Organizations

- The above listed must have a C average or better and be approved by the school administration as good citizens.
- All officers must have attended Russellville one year prior to election with the exception of ninth grade students from a non-high school district.
- Club trips and class trips will not be allowed on school days unless approved by the principal. The sponsor must place group meetings on the calendar; group meetings are discouraged during class time. It is the responsibility of the student to make arrangements with his/her classes prior to attending any trip or activity. This includes all extra-curricular and co- curricular activities.
- All voting will take place during 1st hour and will be conducted by the organization's sponsors.

Student Leadership Team/Student Council

The Student Team shall consist of high school grades 9, 10, 11, and 12.

- The elected class presidents will be considered members of the student council.
- There shall be three additional class representatives elected from each grade. Any representative or elected position must have a C average for the previous semester.
- The student body will elect the student body president; grades 9, 10, 11, and 12 will vote.
- Student body president elect candidates shall submit the proper petition to the office at the announced deadline date. The proper petition form will be available from the principal's office.

Class Officers

Each class will elect two class officers:

- President—automatic Student Council member (conducts class meetings)
- Vice-President (conducts meetings in President's absence)

Parties/Dances

During the school year, several classes and organizations will sponsor dances, parties, and other social activities. The following rules will prevail at these activities.

- Anyone leaving the building or defined area of the activity will not be permitted to return. Anyone not at the party within an hour of the start time will not be permitted to enter unless prior arrangements have been made with sponsors. All parties will end by 11:00 p.m. unless special permission is received.
- Any students that have dropped out will not be allowed to attend.
- Before the principal places an activity on the calendar, he must have the following information:
 - The name of the group or class
 - The type of activity
 - Names of teachers or board members who will be present.
 - NAMES OF THOSE WHO WILL CLEAN UP AFTER THE PARTY.
- Each class or organization will be permitted one activity each semester.
- Each of the four high school classes plus the FFA chapter may have an all-school dance as one of their two social functions.
- All school dances will have an out of school guest list in the office for dates of students who do not attend Russellville. The list will be in the principal's office one week prior to the dance and will be closed at noon the day of the event (Friday at noon if the dance is on Saturday). Some dances may not permit out of school dates. Must be at least 9th grade and under 21 years of age to attend.
- If you drop out of RHS, you will not be allowed to attend any school dance, even as a guest.

The Junior-Senior Prom will be restricted to juniors, seniors, and approved guests. Rules for parties as stated in the student handbook also apply. *NOTE: All outside dates MUST be signed up in the approved time stated by the organization's sponsors. You must meet the deadline with all paperwork and fees as they apply.

King and Queen Candidates

- Once a student wins as King or Queen, they are no longer eligible to be a candidate for the rest of that school year for other activities and may only be a candidate one time for that activity during their high school career. (Courtwarming, Barnwarming, Homecoming, Prom, etc.)

Activity Fees

Each organization shall set dues or fees. The class dues for each year will be \$25 and will be paid to the junior high/high school office.. Only those students who keep their dues or fees paid currently shall be permitted to participate in activities, including Prom. Dues cannot be refunded. These dues and fees are used for prom and graduation.

Failure to participate in the following activities will incur the following fees: Carnival - \$25.

HEALTH SERVICES

Health Program

Upon the registration and entrance of your child into our school, our school nurse will initiate his/her health record, which includes a record of the child's immunizations.

Immunizations are compulsory, according to Missouri School Law (167.181) which states "It is unlawful for any student to attend school unless he/she has been immunized, as required under Public Health and Welfare..."unless "one parent or guardian objects in writing to the school administrator against immunization of their child."

We have a full time school nurse whose duties include the daily routine of administering first aid and counseling with parents regarding health records, etc. We ask for your full cooperation in providing us with your child's health and immunization records.

Immunization Requirements

Since the 1994-1995 school year, Missouri State Statutes for immunization requirements for school attendance will allow no grace period.

All immunization requirements must have been accomplished and records of verification must be in the school files or the student will not be allowed to attend class the first day of school and until these requirements are met.

If you have questions regarding the above, please feel free to contact the school nurse or your child's principal.

Medication Policy for Cole County R-I Schools

The Cole County R-I Schools will administer medications under the following guidelines:

- All Prescription medications to be given longer than 10 days require health form 101-4/04; Authorization for medications to be taken during school hours filled out and signed by a physician prior to giving the medication.
- Short term medicines such as antibiotics, will be given only if in the original prescription bottle. A note accompanying the medicine that states the doses and time the medicine is to be given. Medication WILL NOT BE GIVEN if there is not a note.
- Students may not carry medications at school. All prescription and over the counter medication must be distributed from the nurses office.
- In order for over the counter medicines to be given, the medicine must be supplied by the parent with the student's name on the bottle and a note from the parent/guardian stating the school has permission to administer or a completed health form 102/4/04.
- Emergency medications such as inhalers, epipens, etc. will be an exception with proper physician documentation.
- NO OVER-THE-COUNTER MEDICINES WILL BE GIVEN FROM ANYTHING BUT THE ORIGINAL CONTAINER.
- THE FIRST DOSE OF ANY MEDICATION MUST BE GIVEN AT HOME DUE TO THE POSSIBILITY OF AN ALLERGIC REACTION.

Non Aspirin Pain Reliever

For low-grade fevers (100 or less) students will be offered a non-aspirin pain reliever. The student will be examined again in one hour. If the fever persists, then the parents will be called. Non-aspirin pain relievers will be available for headaches and minor pains as well. The "Authorization for Medications to Be Taken During School Hours" form/health/meds/102 must be filled out before the pain reliever can be given (see below).

If you have any questions concerning the district's policy on medications please feel free to call the school nurse or your child's principal.

Communicable Diseases

A student shall not be permitted to attend classes or other school sponsored activities if the student is known to be afflicted with or liable to transmit any contagious or infectious disease unless the Board or its designee has determined, based upon medical evidence that the student is no longer afflicted with a chronic infectious disease or poses little risk of transmission in the school environment with reasonable precautions.

Any student permitted to attend school with a chronic infectious disease must do so under specified conditions. Failure to adhere to the conditions will result in the student being excluded from school. Any student determined to have a chronic infectious disease and who is not permitted to attend school will be provided instruction in an alternative educational setting in accordance with district policy.

Students with a contagious infectious disease and their families have a right to privacy and a need for confidentiality. Only staff members who have a medical reason to know the identity and condition of such students will be informed. Willful or negligent disclosure of confidential information about a student's medical condition by staff members will be cause of disciplinary action.

LIBRARY/MEDIA SERVICES

Library Rules

- Anything taken from the library area must be checked out with the librarian.
- Books are checked out for two-week periods; they may be rechecked after that period.
- Students who are dismissed from the library will have limited access to the library until such time that the librarian grants full access. They may only use the library while under the direct supervision of a regular classroom teacher.
- Students will have a specific purpose for being in the library which will be written on a library pass by the classroom teacher.
- Report cards will be held at the end of the quarter if overdue books are not returned and fines paid. Any student whose report card is held for the above reasons will lose his/her library privileges for the next quarter.
- Students must go directly to the library and return directly to class. They are not to go to any other part of the building, including the restroom, etc.
- The library is to be a quiet place to work at all times. Students who are disruptive will be asked to go back to class.
- Computers are to be used for school work only.
- No student may be in the library or computer lab without supervision.

The students' cooperation is greatly appreciated in following the above rules. The library can be, and should be, a valuable tool in educational advancement.

FOOD SERVICES

School Breakfast and Lunch Program

Each student will have a code. When the code is entered, it will subtract the amount of the meal from the student's account; each breakfast is \$1.55 and each lunch is \$2.50. A warning will be given when \$3.75 is left in the student's account. The maximum that may be charged is \$7.50. Please make your lunch money payments at the principal's office. This money will be credited to the student's account to be debited as the student purchases breakfast, lunch, or extra portions in the lunch line. The reduced prices are \$0.40 for lunch and \$0.30 for breakfast. Peanut butter sack lunches will be \$0.50.

Lunchroom

Students in grades 7-12 shall be offered, but not required to take, food items they do not intend to eat. However, the law requires they must select at least three items and pay the full meal price. Milk may be one of the excluded items. No food or drink is allowed to leave the lunchroom.

Students may not leave campus during lunch. We have a CLOSED LUNCH. Parents may bring their child lunch but will not be allowed to bring food in for other students. Parents must deliver food to the office, and then the student will be allowed to pick it up.

TRANSPORTATION

Vocational Students Riding To Nichols Career Center

Area vocational students will ride the bus to the vocational school and back unless picked up at the vocational school by a parent and then only if permission is requested from the principal in advance. **VOCATIONAL STUDENTS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO DRIVE THEIR OWN VEHICLES TO VOCATIONAL SCHOOL WITHOUT A COMPLETED APPROVED DRIVING PERMIT FROM NICHOLS CAREER CENTER.**

Driving Cars

Students driving cars will park on the school grounds and in the designated parking spot and will not re-enter cars until the end of the school day. This policy is effective as soon as the car enters the school parking area in the morning. Students are asked not to park in teacher designated areas. Students who arrive in vehicles must immediately enter the building. All vehicles should be registered in the office prior to being parked on school property. Parking on school property is a privilege that can be revoked.

The school has the right to search vehicles when there is reasonable suspicion of wrongdoing. Driving to school is also a privilege that can be taken away at any time. Failure to follow school rules can result in loss of driving privileges.

PERSONAL WIRELESS ELECTRONIC DEVICE

General Guidelines

The Cole R-I School District recognizes the value technology devices add to the educational experience of all students as well as aid in improving communication with parents. Therefore, the use of personally-owned wireless electronic devices including laptops, netbooks, and other approved devices are permitted for students and staff. Cell phones, earbuds, or headphones may not be seen or heard in classrooms. Phones, earbuds, or headphones should be out of sight, except for during passing and meal times.

Such possession or use of these personal wireless devices may not, in any way,

- Disrupt the educational process in the school district
- Endanger the health or safety of the student or anyone else
- Invade the rights of others at school
- Involve in illegal or prohibited conduct of any kind

In addition, students shall not be allowed any personal use during class time. **NO SOCIAL NETWORKING ALLOWED.**

In addition to the guidelines outlined in this policy, the Acceptable Use Policy (AUP) of the Cole R-I School District applies to personal devices that are brought to school. These guidelines are in effect while the student is on school premises. School premises include any place which is owned, rented, or under the control of the Cole R-I School District.

Possession or use of any personal wireless devices by a student is a privilege, which may be forfeited by any student who fails to abide by the terms of this policy.

Access and Appropriate Use

Access is for educational purposes only. The user experience will vary depending on the device used. Use of personal wireless devices is prohibited in locker rooms, dressing rooms, bathrooms, or other locations that are private in nature.

Technical support will not be provided for personal devices. The student must take full responsibility for setting up and maintaining the device. Students are responsible for ensuring their personal wireless device has virus protection and free of any viruses or other files that may affect the district network.

Terms of Service

The Cole R-I School District is providing wireless connectivity as a guest service and offers no guarantees that any use of the wireless connection is in any way secure, or that any privacy can be protected when using this wireless connection. Cole R-I School District also does not guarantee that all areas of the district have wireless coverage. Use of the wireless network is entirely at the risk of the user, and the Cole R-I School District is not responsible for any loss of any information that may arise from the use of the wireless connection, or for any loss, injury or damages resulting from the use of the wireless connection.

Safety and Security

Students who bring in electronic wireless devices do so at their own risk. The Cole R-I School District shall not be responsible for the safety, security, loss, or damage of personal electronic devices that students choose to bring to school. Investigation by school officials of loss, theft or damage will be minimal unless it can be established that the student adequately secured the device, such as keeping it in a locked locker.

The Cole R-I School District does not provide personal property insurance for any personally owned wireless communication devices. Such insurance can be obtained by an independent carrier.

Consequences of Inappropriate Use

Loss of access to personal wireless devices can occur if the district becomes concerned about its appropriate use. Examples of District concerns include safety, potential for disruption to educational processes, and security issues related to connecting a personal computer to the District network.

When the devices are used on school property, they will be treated as school property. The district may examine the personal electronic devices and search their contents if there is reason to believe that school policies, rules or regulations have been violated. The building administration may involve law enforcement if the device is used for an illegal purpose or for a purpose that causes harm to others.

Permission for student use of personal wireless devices is allowed after the Acceptable Use Policy agreement is signed by the student and a parent/guardian.

Student Technology Use Agreement – Students must agree to the following:

1. All network and computing resources of the Cole R-I School District and access to the Internet exist to support the instructional and educational needs of the district and use of the network for non-school related work is prohibited.
2. The District network is not for private or commercial business use, political, or religious purposes.
3. Students are prohibited from changing or, in any way, altering a network device, a device or peripheral name, file and/or folder names.
4. Network resources, including hardware, peripherals, and software, may not be used for personal entertainment (games) and/or any private activities.
5. District computers may not be used illegally to duplicate copyrighted software.
6. No student will use District owned computers, peripherals or the Internet to deliberately access obscene, pornographic or otherwise non-educational material or show others how to do the same.
7. No student will deliberately or willfully cause damage to computer equipment or software or assist others in doing the same.
8. Sending material likely to be offensive, objectionable, or harassing is strictly prohibited.
9. Any use of the District network, which accesses outside resources must conform to this StudentTechnology Usage Agreement.
10. Students are responsible to take precautions to prevent a virus infection on the equipment of the Cole R-1 School District and immediately report to an instructor if a virus is detected.

Access is a privilege that entails responsibility. Individual users of the District's computer network are responsible for their own behavior and communications over the network. The district shall not be responsible for any information that may be lost, damaged, or unavailable when using the network or for any information retrieved via the Internet.

Violation of any of the items listed will result in disciplinary action as outlined in the Cole R-I Junior High/High School Student Handbook. Further, serious violations may be punishable under Missouri criminal statutes covering unlawful access, altering or damaging any computer system, network, software or database, with the intent to interrupt the normal function of any organization.

DISCLAIMER: The Cole R-I School District will not be responsible for any virus transferred from District operated equipment to systems outside the District. It is highly recommended that any data obtained through the use of District operated equipment should be thoroughly checked for viruses before use outside the District.
